# WHAT IS A TREE? SOME DEFINITIONS by Alan Pollack



course, many different kinds of plants, so a good place to start our discussion is with some definitions. So, what is a tree? A tree is a woody plant that is over 20 feet tall. Shrubs, on the other hand, are also woody,

but are less than 20 feet tall. Then there are the herbs, or herbaceous plants, which lack woody tissue, such as perennials, grasses, bulbs, etc. And finally, there are so-called sub-shrubs, which are herbaceous plants, but have a woody base. Frequently, these guys die back annually followed by re-growth.

Like animals, plants like to hang out with other plants—sometimes of the same species and sometimes with different species. Plant species are compatible with each other when they share the same environmental needs, e.g., type of soil, amount of sunlight, amount of rainfall. When a group of plants of different species hang out together, it is called a plant community, or habitat. When defined broadly, there are eight plant communities in California: Chaparral, Coastal (Sage) Scrub, Grassland, (Southern Oak) Woodland, Forest, Desert Scrub, and Desert Woodland. Defined more narrowly, these can be broken down into about 30 distinct habitats. I will limit further descriptions to the three habitats that are most typical of the San Fernando Valley and its surrounding areas.

Chaparral is found in hot, dry areas with well drained, thin, rocky soil from sea level to about 3000 feet.

Large, evergreen shrubs predominate, with few if any trees and a variable herbaceous layer. Coastal Sage Scrub is found in flatter, coastal areas with deeper soil. Much of metropolitan Los Angeles is located in this zone. Again, shrubs predominate, there is an absence of trees, but sub-shrubs and herbaceous plants are present. Southern Oak Woodland is found in our foothills, in sheltered inland valleys and canyons. Trees predominate, but there is a discontinuous canopy that allows some shrubs and many herbaceous plants to thrive.

By going to LasPilitas.com, click on the "My Native Plant Selector", enter the "zip code" of your garden and you will find what plant community you live in. Go to the bottom of the page and you will find a list of plants native to your area. One can then go to the site's encyclopedia for a photo of each plant and a description of its needs. A nice segue into next month's topic: selecting plants and how to plant. See you then.  $\psi$

# Monthly Field Trip Report by Richard Barth

Our April 26 visit to the high desert north of Palm Springs doubled as a SFVAS Birdathon. Windy conditions confronted us in Morongo Valley where we did most of our birding. While overall numbers were down for the trip, some very special birds were found.

Brown-crested Flycatcher, Summer Tanager, Vermilion Flycatcher, Lawrence's Goldfinch and Yellow-breasted Chat were key target birds on hand for us. It was great to encounter Bell's Vireo, which we sometimes miss. Rufous-crowned Sparrow and the rare Calliope Hummingbird were seen for the first time in memory on this trip. Expected but always sought after are Blue Grosbeak, Lazuli Bunting, Costa's Hummingbird, Black-chinned Hummingbird, Gambel's Quail, Verdin and Ladder-backed Woodpecker. Some of our participants spotted a Greater Roadrunner. Other species of note included Barn Owl, Hammond's Flycatcher, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Black-headed Grosbeak, Hooded Oriole, Cassin's Vireo, Warbling Vireo, Yellow Warbler, Black-throated Gray Warbler, Wilson's Warbler, Western Tanager, Western Bluebird, Phainopepla and Eurasian Collared-Dove.

Black Rock Campground (Joshua Tree NP) produced Brewer's Sparrow and Cactus Wren. Scott's Oriole was tallied here on Friday evening by participants arriving early and camping over.  $\forall$ 

Our species count for the trip was 56.

# Springtime in Chatsworth Nature Preserve by Art Langton

On April 13, Chatsworth Nature Preserve provided the setting for the first of the Chapter's Birdathon events. The exceptionally warm morning provided 51 species, somewhat short of the number predicted as the scarcity of significant rainfall this spring and the warm weather combined to dry up the seasonal marshes supporting puddle ducks and migrating waders.

The lack of other anticipated migratory species also kept numbers low for the ten participants taking part. Other than yellowthroats and yellow-rumps no other warblers were seen nor were the expected Ashthroated Flycatchers or Warbling Vireos. Any sign of nesting activity by Tricolored Blackbirds was absent.

Nevertheless birders enjoyed a variety of sparrows including excellent views of Rufous-crowned Sparrows, Western Bluebirds, Bullock's Orioles, Black-headed Grosbeaks, Western Kingbirds, Lesser Goldfinches, Phainopeplas, Red-tailed and Cooper's Hawks, and a single kingfisher. Several Virginia Rails were heard as well as a single Sora. A single Green Heron was the sole heron-egret representative on a largely empty pond.  $\psi$
