# SPECIAL EVENT: Birding Southeast Arizona, July 25—August 1

SFVAS has organized a special field trip to search for specialties in southeast Arizona. Bird as much as you want, from one day to the entire week. The trip will be led by Michael McQuerry, a well known southern California birder who has spent several summers birding Arizona for its many species seen no where else in the United States.

The first four days of the trip, will be centered in Sierra Vista, followed by a travel day through the scenic Chiricahua Mountains with the final three days birding out of Portal.

#### **Tentative itinerary includes:**

Saturday, July 25: Miller and Ash Canyons visiting stocked hummingbird feeders with a night owling session.

Sunday, July 26: The Patagonia Loop, including Paton's feeders, the Nature Reserve, the famous roadside rest and Patagonia Lake.

Monday, July 27: Madera Canyon.

Tuesday, July 28: Fort Huachuca canyons for trogons and other canyon specialties

Wednesday, July 29: San Pedro Nature Reserve and Willcox Playa. Afternoon travel onward through the Chiricahuas to Portal.

Thursday, July 30: Portal area, including Stateline Road and Cave Creek. Evening owling.

Friday, July 31: Rustler Peak for high elevation Mexican specialties.

Saturday, August 1: A search for birds we missed as we start our return to California.

## BIRDATHON 2009 by Jim Moore

Jim Moore together with six other intrepid birders including Dick Barth, Judy Howell, Kris Ohlenkamp, Rick Tallman, Bob Thille, and Mike Van Norman met at 5:30 a.m. on April 22, in Acton to start a day-long Birdathon that lasted until 8:00 p.m. and covered 225 miles. Ten sites were birded with 123 species identified.

The first stop, Lake Palmdale netted 16 species, including at least 150 Tri-colored Blackbirds, a good start for the day. This was followed by stops at the Joshua Forest in Palmdale, the Lancaster Sewage Ponds, and onward to Jawbone Canyon, with stops at the DWP house and Butterbredt Springs.

The afternoon included lunch at Central Park in California City and a two hour visit to the Silver Springs Resort in Galileo Hills. Then onward to Piute Ponds where, with daylight running out, we added 16 new species, bringing our total for the day to 117 species.

We reached our final stop at Apollo Park in Lancaster at 7:00 p.m. to get a look at the Lesser Night-Hawks which had been seen each of the previous three years. They didn't disappoint, with about twelve making their erratic flight pattern over the lake about ten minutes after sundown. They and five other new species increased our total to 123 species.  $\forall$ 



#### OF TRASH AND CLEANUPS

Haskell Creek, flowing through the Sepulveda Basin Wildlife Reserve, looks wonderful following the SFVAS April cleanup!

The morning of Saturday, April 18, a team of 38 volunteers gave their time and efforts to rid Haskell Creek of trash. On a beautiful morning, they labored in and next to the creek, stuffing plastic shopping bags, Styrofoam and other junk into large plastic bags for the Department of Recreation and Parks to haul away.

In the process the volunteers got tired, dirty, and muddy. Some even fell into the creek. All volunteers detested the plastic bags and Styrofoam they found. Several opined that plastic shopping bags, foam cups, and food containers should be banned citywide or statewide.

The trash problem in Haskell Creek and this region's waterways is huge. Late this winter, the lower branches of willows and other trees lining Haskell Creek had become festooned in plastics, some from littering park users, most washed in from areas of the Valley north of Sepulveda Basin. The SFVAS creek cleanup followed several other cleanups, including one in March by 120 tenth graders from Brentwood School. At the start of our cleanup on April 18, there were many hard-to-reach sections still clothed in plastics. Now

Haskell Creek's reach between Wildlife Way and Burbank is beautiful, although the volunteers reported that there was more trash they could not remove.



# Monthly Field Trip Report by Richard Barth

April 25 marked our visit to the high desert north of Palm Springs, with the trip doubling as a SF-VAS Birdathon. We tallied 63 species on a beautiful, mild day.

The morning was spent at Big Morongo Valley Preserve and adjacent Covington Park. We found most of our target birds plus had some very special sightings. A Townsend's Solitaire was the first in memory spotted on this trip. We saw a recently-reported White-throated Sparrow and were given directions to two families of Long-eared Owls! Expected favorites on hand were Brown-crested Flycatcher, Vermilion Flycatcher, Costa's Hummingbird, Yellow-breasted Chat and Blue Grosbeak. Other birds of note were Swainson's Thrush, Mountain Chickadee, Verdin, Blackchinned Hummingbird and Rufous Hummingbird. Two Soras were heard calling from a riparian area. Blackheaded Grosbeak, Western Tanager and Hooded Oriole added excitement to the day. In addition to the chat, the warbler stand-outs were MacGillivray's, Nashville, Yellow, Townsend's and Wilson's. Hammond's and Pacific-slope Flycatchers provided good studies. Additional species that should be mentioned are Cooper's Hawk, Gambel's Quail, Phainopepla, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Cassin's Kingbird, Western Kingbird, Lincoln's Sparrow, Golden-crowned Sparrow, Warbling Vireo and Western Bluebird. Somehow we missed Summer Tanager, Lazuli Bunting and Lawrence's Goldfinch this year.

After lunch we drove to Black Rock Campground in Joshua Tree National Park. Pinyon Jay (we got lucky), Black-throated Sparrow, Scott's Oriole, Ladder-backed Woodpecker and Cactus Wren were terrific finds there.  $\psi$ 

#### **BULL CREEK RESTORATION PROJECT**

Many visitors and users of Lake Balboa are wondering about the major construction project that began last June in the western end of Anthony C. Beilenson Park, immediately west of Lake Balboa in the Sepulveda Basin. Inside the fenced off area is the 28-acre Bull Creek Channel Ecosystem Restoration Project. Completion is expected by the time the June-July 2009 issue of Phainopepla is mailed.

Excellent news for birdwatchers, walkers and the environment, the project was designed to restore native riparian and upland habitat to an area of Sepulveda Basin that had become severely degraded. The project creates a small wildlife reserve along much of the 3,000 feet that Bull Creek flows from the Orange Bus Line to the Los Angeles River.

Members of the Sepulveda Basin Wildlife Areas Steering Committee had been working with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the City of Los Angeles Dept. of Recreation and Parks to realize restoration of this stretch of Bull Creek since the early 1990s. Once a lovely riparian ecosystem, this part of Bull Creek gradually became inappropriately graded, highly disturbed, and dominated by invasive exotic plants, unable to support much native and migratory wildlife.

The Bull Creek restoration project is intended to "enhance and restore wildlife resources, reduce flooding and provide interpretative and passive recreational

amenities," in the words of a June 2007 press release from Congressman Brad Sherman's office. Congressman Sherman secured \$4.9 million in federal funds for the project, with the remainder of the costs coming from the City of Los Angeles.

The creek channel was recontoured and exotic vegetation removed. An oxbow-shaped side channel was excavated to allow water to flow around a oneacre island thus created. Reclaimed water from Lake Balboa is now pumped into the upper end of the creek to supplement natural flows. Bridges and pedestrian trails have been built, similar in appearance to those in the Sepulveda Basin Wildlife Reserve.

A meeting with Lake Balboa supporters was held this April 14 at the Sepulveda Garden Center. It was generally agreed by all attendees that the Bull Creek area should continue to be fenced off until sometime next spring, in order to give the new plantings time to become established.

Meanwhile, the rather bare-looking area is already supporting a significant amount of birdlife. Kris Ohlenkamp and I toured the area before the community meeting on April 14 and observed around 25 bird species in less than an hour. Beginning next spring we will be able to stroll along the pathways and perhaps lead bird walks there.  $\psi$
