### 2010 Christmas Bird Count, Comments and Commentary by Arthur Langton, Compiler

Even though the Valley Christmas Bird Count has been taking place for over fifty years, each and every count is a unique experience with its share of challenges, surprises, and demands. The 2010 count was no exception. With Christmas and New Years falling on a Saturday, opportunities for bird count dates were limited and resulted in several counts in the area being scheduled concurrently with birders faced with difficult decisions between which counts to attend. Due to the need to rearrange leadership several of our leaders were counting new areas. Some of the usual count areas didn't get counted at all for a variety of reasons including some confusion in directions and poor communication between compiler and counters. Due to ongoing construction and renovation, Reseda Park pond with its dozens of Mallards, wigeon, coots, and gulls wasn't counted at all.

Nevertheless in a record-setting December for rainfall, perhaps the wettest on record and with overnight rain within hours of the start of the count, December 26 was clear and cool with high overcast but no rain anywhere, a pleasant contrast to neighboring counts conducted on other dates. Thanks to Jim Moore for the suggestion of the 26th. This right call attracted 47 participants who recorded over 17,000 birds representing 132 species. These numbers are below last year's totals of 139 species and over 20,000 birds counted, perhaps a consequence of less comprehensive coverage of our count area and the need for additional counters at Sepulveda Wildlife Area and Hansen Dam. These are both large areas and need as many eyes as possible. The compiler still has horrible memories of showing up for the 1978 bird count in the pouring rain, terrible lighting conditions, and being the only one there. By four in the afternoon he was soaked through, the tally sheets were wet and disintegrating, and binoculars useless-wet both inside and out. He's never done a Hansen Dam bird count since.

On the brighter side, three new species made the count list. Two are exotics, the Mute Swan from Europe and the Nanday Parakeet, native to South America. The third was an eastern vagrant, the Pine Warbler, discovered earlier in the month and seen by many in the Hansen Dam Park adjacent to Foothill Blvd. Of almost equal interest were three count week species. Count week species are defined as those birds seen three days prior to count day or three days following count day, but not on count day. Birds that almost made the count list were a Broad-winged Hawk which had been well documented and observed in Sepulveda Basin since the beginning of the month but not reported after December 23 and a second-year Bald Eagle seen at Sepulveda December 24 along with some Bonaparte's Gulls, also not seen count day.

As always several expected species seen earlier or just after the count escaped observation on count day. These included Canvasbacks seen earlier in the month at Chatsworth Nature Preserve, Least or Western Sandpipers seen after January 1 along the banks of the Los Angeles River, White Pelicans, a staple at Sepulveda Basin for the past several years, and Wilson's Snipe always few in number under the best of circumstances. Of the common woodpeckers, no Downys were seen. Montane species which cold, wet weather might have pushed to lower elevations were missed. These were probably

somewhere, but not where counters were looking.

Long-eared and Western Screech Owls made the list for the third consecutive year returning to a restricted access area on the north slope of the Santa Monica Mountains in back of Encino-Tarzana. Canada Geese numbers may be high due to the ability of the geese to move distances quickly during daylight hours. Nevertheless geese were reported from eight different locations including El Carizo Park and the newly filled percolation basins near the intersection of Paxton Street, Devonshire, and Arleta Avenue.

Chatsworth Nature Preserve recorded approximately 70 species including the only harriers, Green-winged Teal, and rails plus most of the nuthatches, meadowlarks, Vesper and Savannah Sparrows seen count day. Large numbers of puddle ducks and geese were counted while taking advantage of the seasonal ponds newly filled with rainwater. Counters at Hansen Dam found nearly 80 species. Of note was the single White-tailed Kite, Townsend's Warbler, Hutton's and Cassin's Vireos seen count day along with all the White-throated swifts on the count. Of course the Pine Warbler, relocated by Kimball Garrett, the original discoverer of the bird, on count day in our count area was an added plus.

Doug Martin checking out El Carizo Park and golf course, Pacoima Wash, and Lopez Canyon recorded over 70 species including both Red-naped and Red-breasted Sapsuckers and the only Barn Owl and Phainopepla, Cedar Waxwings, and Fox Sparrows seen in the count area. Lake Balboa provided over 1800 coots plus a good collection of ducks, a Ross's Goose, Eared Grebes, two Myrtle Warblers and a variety of herons and egrets.

Within the Sepulveda Wildlife Area and along the banks of the Los Angeles River were counted Greater Yellowlegs, Spotted Sandpipers, Black-necked Stilts, more herons and egrets, two Osprey, and the Mute Swan which seemed to alternate between the wildlife area and Lake Balboa. A Blackthroated Gray and Wilson's Warblers and ten Hooded Mergansers were all part of this 70+ species count.

Pierce College, despite much of the campus being off limits due to construction, recorded over 40 species including a Gray Flycatcher, 450 Canada Geese, two Merlins, and lots of Black Phoebes. Limekiln Canyon had a count of 30 species while O'Melveny Park came in right behind with a count of 29 including Golden-crowned Sparrows.

The complier extends his thanks and appreciation to all those who took part in the 2010 Christmas Bird Count whether participating in one of our formal count groups or by sending in feeder, yard, or neighborhood counts. Your time and effort plus good fortune with the weather contributed to the success of the count. Thanks also for the prompt return of count totals, fees, and all the information needed to satisfy the requirements of the National Audubon Society. Thanks also to the personnel of the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power for arranging our entrance into and the opportunity to continue our count within Chatsworth Nature Preserve. Next year those missing birds will be found somewhere by someone, but we'll still have a calendar dilemma with one Saturday being Christmas Eve and another being New Year's Eve. 🗤

John Luker is a Documentary Cameraman/Photographer. He is Vice-President of the Santa Susana Mountain Parks Association (SSMPA) and Chairman of the Santa Susana Volunteers working on developing an environmentally safe and sound cleanup plan for the former Rocketdyne plant in the Simi Hills.

### Special Guest Speaker - Mel White

Mel White is a freelance writer who lives in Little Rock, Arkansas, and specializes in travel and natural history. He has written more than 40 articles for National Geographic Traveler magazine and more than a dozen for National Geographic. He has covered destinations including Australia's Great Barrier Reef, New Zealand, Borneo, the

Amazon River, Mount Kilimanjaro, Madagascar, Socotra Island, and the Swiss Alps. He has written or contributed to more than 25 guidebooks and nature-related publications. He wrote A Birder's Guide to Arkansas, Exploring the Great Texas Coastal Birding Trail, the National Geographic Guide to Birdwatching Sites, and National Geographic Complete National Parks of the United States.

For his program, Mr. White will discuss an expedition to the rainforest of the remote Foja Mountains of western New Guinea, where he accompanied only the second group of scientists to explore an area that has been called "the new Garden of Eden." Several new species of animals and plants were discovered in the Fojas, including the endemic Wattled Smokey Honeyeater.

### PHAINOPEPLA PHOTO OF THE MONTH by Mathew Tekulsky

There is no joy in life greater than taking a beautiful bird photograph. I have been photographing the birds in my side yard for the last fifteen years, and I really don't know which of the pictures I like best. Is it the Western Scrub-Jay with the green grape in his beak? Or the Allen's Hummingbird in midair, with his wings outspread? Maybe it is the Hooded Oriole proudly perched on the oriole feeder. I have also taken many bird photographs "in the field," including a headshot of the American White Pelican at Lake Balboa in Van Nuys, with the bird's beak tucked into his feathers; and a headshot of the Bald Eagle, taken on Catalina Island. When I look at each of these photographs, it brings back the memory of interacting with the bird and it reminds me of the challenge of producing a great bird image.

The advent of digital cameras has made bird photography more rewarding than ever. After a bird walk, bird photographers enjoy the pleasure of down-

loading the images, cropping them if necessary, printing them, or emailing them to friends. Bird photography also gives us a chance to consult the bird books and improve our identification skills.

Because we want to share the joys of bird photography, we at the Phainopepla have decided to institute a "Photo of the Month" feature, in which one of our members presents a bird photograph that is taken within our area, ideally on one of our bird walks. Each submission should include the location of the photograph, the date it was taken, whether it was on a SFVAS bird walk, what camera and lens was used, a short account of how the photo was produced, and a brief profile of the photographer. ### The Great Backyard Bird Count, February 18—21, 2011

Bird watchers coast to coast are invited to take part in the 14th annual Great Backyard Bird Count, Friday, February 18, through Monday, February 21, 2011.
