There were many new faces at Kris Ohlenkamp's Sepulveda Basin Birdathon walk. His group saw many male and female pairs due to mating season. They also got a look at a Great Horned Owl sitting on her nest!

John and Andrew Willis travel along the Los Angeles River was a great tribute to the Lori Willis Memorial. They had a sighting of about 100 Black Skimmers and many other sea birds.

Those who were with Art Langton on his Malibu Creek Birdathon were treated to lots of "high dollar" birds, including several Lazuli Buntings.

Although rather crisp and cloudy, it was still a great day for birds on Carolyn Oppenheimer's O'Melveny Birdathon walk. Special sightings included a Peregrine Falcon overhead and a beautiful Western Tanager.

Jim Moore reported that his group had good views of Lesser Nighthawks this year on his Antelope Valley Big Day.



Despite very windy conditions for Dick Barth's field trip, his group saw a Plumbeous Vireo and a Vermilion Flycatcher along with other good finds. They also HEARD a Yellow-breasted Chat and a Bell's Vireo.

Art Langton birded solo again this year, making several stops along Highway 33.

#### End of Our Year

As we take a hiatus from our monthly meetings in the summer, we use the June 25 Potluck event to reflect back and anticipate the next year. In case you cannot make it, this is a good opportunity to review this year.

It has been a very good year for SFVAS. We were closely involved in the first ever BirdFest at King Gillette Ranch in the Santa Monica Mountains. The second one is planned for early 2016. If you missed the first one, do consider coming next year.

We have a new website brimming with information and our Facebook page has exploded with new followers. We have also opened a Twitter account. It is hard to spread the word about our activities and we are doing our best! We have also had a table at many events in the area this year. You may have had the opportunity to visit it and maybe helped dissect an owl pellet.

We have continued our very successful education programs, both in the Sepulveda Basin Environmental Education Program (SBEEP), in which we offer public schools free field trips, and through classroom visits. Our pleasure filled bird walks and field trips have been well attended and well received. The recent Bird LA Day saw large groups introduced to the pleasures of birding in the local area. Our Audubon-at-Home program thrives with

many consultations to homeowners on how to create a more bird friendly space.

On the environmental side, we have reviewed many issues and are actively working on behalf of our chapter members to preserve a variety of important avian habitats. We continue to monitor the clean up at the Santa Susanna Field Laboratory and are supporting the idea of it becoming a National Monument. Similarly we are active in presenting motions and ideas for the Rim of the Valley Corridor, which would incorporate and protect many additional acres to the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area. In the Antelope Valley area we have been involved in helping to prevent or mitigate damage to bird life from solar and wind energy plants. On a smaller scale, we were instrumental in ensuring that water be provided to Holiday Lake to support a large colony of endangered Tri-Colored Blackbirds. We are also investigating the issues presented by the various potential routes for the California High Speed Rail from Palmdale to Burbank.

We will be welcoming two new board members at the Potluck and are fortunate in that our termed out Board members will be available to continue to work closely with us. I hope to see you there, but if you cannot make it I hope we will see you at another event in the next year. —by Rose Leibowitz

#### Monthly Field Trip Report by Richard Barth

This year's Morro Bay Weekend fell on March 21-22, with some of us arriving a day early to build a three-day list for the event. This turned out to be an outstanding trip in terms of weather and the variety of birds on hand. Target birds Pigeon Guillemot, Chestnut-backed Chickadee and Brant were readily seen. Some highlight sightings: Long-tailed Duck, Common Goldeneye, Golden Eagle, Varied Thrush and Summer Tanager. Waterfowl species totaled 16, shorebird species 12. Also of note were Great Horned Owl (heard), Peregrine Falcon, American White Pelican, Wild Turkey, California Thrasher, Hooded Oriole, Brown Creeper, "Myrtle" Yellow-rumped Warbler, Wilson's Warbler, an almost pure "Slate-colored" Dark-eyed Junco, Pine Siskin (heard) and Purple Finch. The three expected loon species showed well, as did the three cormorants. A Wrentit at Montana de Oro gave us rare open views as it twice popped up briefly and vocalized on top of a shrub. Honorable mention birds of interest: Osprey, Belted Kingfisher, California Quail, Steller's Jay, Pacific-slope Flycatcher (heard), Hermit Thrush, White-breasted Nuthatch (heard), Fox Sparrow (both "Sooty" and "Slate-colored"), Golden-crowned Sparrow and Western Meadowlark.

Our Morongo Valley area trip took place on April 25 and again served as a Birdathon Event. We tallied only 52 species this year, as very high winds developed and cut short our birding. Before the onset of the winds some terrific birds were found, including Brown-crested Flycatcher, White-winged Dove, Summer Tanager and Vermilion Flycatcher. We heard Yellow-breasted Chat in several spots. Hummingbirds on hand were Costa's, Black-chinned, Rufous and Anna's. We found both Plumbeous and Cassin's Vireo. Noteworthy were Verdin, Bell's Vireo (heard), Ladder-backed Woodpecker, Phainopepla, California Thrasher and Lark Sparrow. We saw no empid flycatchers this year. Doing their part in brightening up the landscape were Black-headed Grosbeak, Western Tanager, Hooded and Bullock's Orioles, Yellow and Townsend's Warblers, Cassin's and Western Kingbirds and Western Bluebird. A bit surprising there in the high desert was an Acorn Woodpecker, working its way up Big Morongo Canyon. Because of the windy conditions we didn't make our usual visit to Black Rock Campground in Joshua Tree National Park.

#### Healthy Soil for a Healthy Wildlife Garden

A healthy, wildlife garden, like any other garden, is built on healthy soil. This article focuses on ways to keep it so.

**AVOID PESTICIDES:** In an earlier article ("Have some poison, my dear", *June/July 2014*) I wrote about how these toxic chemicals travel up the wildlife food chain, killing as it goes. At the bottom of the food chain are the small microorganisms that inhabit the soil and are a vital part of its ecosystem. In a balanced garden there are pests and there are predators that feed on the pests and keep them in check. Incidentally, tilling the soil is another way of disrupting the soil's ecosystem. Rather than tilling to get rid of weeds, spread mulch to inhibit weed growth. More on mulching below.

AVOID CHEMICAL FERTILIZERS: Plants need food only during their growing season and then in a slow, measured fashion. Chemical fertilizers force feed a plant and stimulate rapid, unnatural growth. Kind of like cocaine for plants. Research has shown that plants are healthier and last longer when provided with organic fertilizers such as manures of various kinds, and compost. As these natural, organic materials decompose, in addition to the plants being fed, the soil structure is improved. If you want to avoid feeding altogether, put native plants in your garden. In most cases, fertilization is not only unnecessary, but will actually kill the native plant.

**MULCHING:** I wrote about mulching in reference to being water wise—keeping the soil cool and retaining moisture. If the mulch is an organic material, as it slowly decomposes its nutrients return to the soil enriching it. Organic mulches of various kinds can be purchased or obtained free from your city's recycling program. By letting the leaves and pine needles and other falling litter remain in planted areas, Mother Nature is providing us with mulch delivered free of charge to your garden beds.

**PREVENTING EROSION:** Erosion is often a problem for those living on sloping ground or hillsides. The usual strategies include terracing, retaining walls or berms, drainage channels, and keeping the hillside or slope planted. Many native plants are useful for this purpose as they have deep root systems and some do an especially good job of holding soil in place.

Successful gardening begins with attention to our garden's soil. Be good to it and it will nurture your garden's plants—home to food for the wildlife you hope to care for.
