

2015 CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT Saturday, December 19, 2015 Birders Needed!

Once again this year, the San Fernando Valley Audubon Society will join chapters across the country and in North and South America, Hawaii, and the Caribbean to take part in the National Audubon Society's 115th annual Christmas Bird Count. The initial San Fernando Valley CBC was held in 1957 and this will represent our 58th successive CBC. Over the years there have been some interesting changes in bird populations in the count circle as the valley has transitioned into a more suburban area. Last year, with 59 counters in 16 locations, we tallied 134 species, just about average for the last ten years, but well short of our record count of 160 species in 1993. To approach that record, we need more birders counting birds in their neighborhood and joining established count sectors.

Extensive birding experience is not a prerequisite, only a willingness to come out and count—wind, rain, or shine. Those unable to join one of the count groups may assist by noting species and numbers of birds at backyard feeders, local parks, and neighborhoods provided such counts take place within a 7.5 mile radius circle from the count center at the intersection of Balboa and Nordhoff. Please report all such counts along with the time spent observing to Jim Moore by e-mail (jimmoore@socal.rr.com) no later than and preferably before January 14, 2016.

Count participation is free and open to all. Traditional count sectors are listed below.

"We have an abundance of House Finches, Sparrows and Junkos this time of year" says SFV Audubon member Richard Medvitz. So not surprisingly, visits from predators are expected. Juvenile accipiter's can be difficult to tell apart, but after careful research Richard concluded he was observing the less common Sharp-shinned Hawk. "The books show the Cooper's juvenile with an orange-buff head and thin streaks on breast. Not so with this bird. Please correct me if I'm wrong."

SEE YOU THERE

September & October Monthly Field Trips (by Richard Barth)

On September 19 we visited Huntington Central Park and Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve in Orange County. At HCP the warblers found were Wilson's, Yellow, Black-throated Gray, Orange-crowned, Townsend's and Common Yellowthroat but we missed a recently reported American Redstart. We had good comparative looks at Hutton's Vireo and Ruby-crowned Kinglet. Western Tanager, Hooded Oriole, House Wren, Nuttall's Woodpecker, Green Heron, Red-shouldered Hawk, American Goldfinch, Western Bluebird and Song Sparrow were present as well as exotics Scaly-breasted Munia and Northern Red Bishop in good numbers. A White-faced Ibis flock flew over the park in "V" formation. Bolsa Chica featured two very special birds for us, Ridgway's Rail and Reddish Egret. It also produced interesting fare like Sora, Horned Lark, Belted Kingfisher, Forster's Tern, Elegant Tern, Eared Grebe, Brown Pelican, American White Pelican, Say's Phoebe and Savannah Sparrow (including "Belding's"). Raptors seen were American Kestrel, Osprey, Red-tailed Hawk, Cooper's Hawk and Turkey Vulture. Ducks of note were Northern Shoveler, Cinnamon Teal and Gadwall. High tide covered many of the mudflats and limited our shorebird observations, but we managed to tally Ruddy Turnstone, Long-billed Curlew, Marbled Godwit, Greater Yellowlegs (hidden, heard), Willet, Western Sandpiper, dowitcher (sp), Black-bellied Plover, Black-necked Stilt and American Avocet.

October 17 marked our trip to El Dorado Park in Long Beach. We were pleased to see Tropical Kingbird and Hairy Woodpecker, two target species having been recently reported in the park. There had also been a heads-up on Greater White-fronted Goose and Red-breasted Nuthatch, and indeed we were successful in locating them. We missed some other previously found notables but were happy to tally Belted Kingfisher, Green Heron, Hutton's Vireo, Western Meadowlark, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, White-breasted Nuthatch, Western Tanager, Bullock's Oriole, Pacific-slope Flycatcher (heard), and Hermit Thrush. Our warbler list featured Wilson's, Townsend's, Yellow-rumped, Orange-crowned and Common Yellowthroat. Our raptor list: Peregrine Falcon, Osprey, Red-tailed Hawk, Red-shouldered Hawk, American Kestrel and Turkey Vulture. Also of interest on the day were Western Grebe, Eared Grebe, Northern Flicker, Cassin's Kingbird, Say's Phoebe, Downy Woodpecker, House Wren, and Spotted Towhee. A gopher snake entertained us on the west edge of Area III.

Meet in the parking lot on the left. Allow some extra time, as Coldwater Canyon can be a slow road. UPDATE ON THE HIDDEN CREEKS ESTATES DEVELOPMENT by Mark Osokow

The environmentally destructive Hidden Creeks Estates gated housing development proposed by Texas land and oil field developer, Forestar Group Inc., is presently being considered for approval by an Advisory Agency of the City of Los Angeles. A decision by the agency is expected on December 1. SFVAS opposes this development, which will involve construction of 188 large homes on a 245-acre site, currently in unincorporated county area, wedged between Browns and Mormon Canyons in the foothills of the Santa Susana Mountains north of Porter Ranch and near Michael D. Antonovich Regional Park at Joughin Ranch. SFVAS is strongly opposed to this development, which will require annexation of the development site by the City. The Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority (MRCA), the Sierra Club, and Santa Susana Mountain Park Association also oppose this development. Among the adverse impacts expected from the development are the outright destruction of more than 400 oak trees and the surrounding riparian and upland landscape, disruption of existing wildlife corridors, degradation of two perennial tributaries of the Los Angeles River (Browns and Mormon Creeks), increased erosion, interference with public access, a new major road fragmenting some of the finest remaining open space in the area, and the re-grading of an estimated 7.5 million cubic yards of soil in a seismically unstable area. The annexation will require a vote of the full city council. Tell your council representative you are appalled that this proposed development has gotten this far in the planning process and that annexation by the city must not occur. Our first walk, advertised in the last copy of the *Phainopepla*, attracted a good group. It was hot and dry but we managed a good tally of birds including a Rock Wren, a Cassin's Kingbird, a covey of California Quail and a Nuttall's Woodpecker.

Audubon-at-Home by Alan Pollack Want wildlife? Go native!

California native plants are those which are indigenous to our state—they were here before the European settlers arrived. There are over 6000 species of California natives and another 6000 plus cultivars developed from those. There has been a rapid decline of our native flora as a result of massive development and as homeowners and landscapers import plant material from distant regions. The record drought in the mid- to late 1970s sparked interest in restoring and conserving our native flora and our current drought (now in its fourth year) should add further impetus to this trend if one is at all environmentally conscious and concerned.

In addition to the effort to conserve our natural flora, there are other good reasons to go native. Native plants are adapted to our climate because most have deep root systems. Most can survive drought, frost, wind and fires (if they are not too frequent). Once established, many will survive on little or no irrigation. They are adapted to our generally poor soil. Amending the soil and fertilizing is not just unnecessary—it will often kill the plant. Allowed to grow to their natural size and shape, they require less pruning, which may be needed only for aesthetic or health reasons or to rejuvenate the plant. And, finally, native plants attract and support our native wildlife, including pollinators and insect predators, eliminating the need for environmentally harmful pesticides.

And then there are good reasons to avoid and, in some cases, eliminate non-native (aka, exotic) plants from our gardens: Removed from their natural habitats (where there are typically built-in controls to their growth) and planted in a strange, new habitat (where such controls often do not exist), non-natives may grow rampantly, displacing our native flora. Many are very thirsty and some pose extreme

fire hazard. Finally, they may offer little support to our native wildlife.

To learn more about native plants and how to use them in your garden, check out these websites: www.cnps.org (California Native Plant Society); www.theodorepayne.org; www.laspilitas.com (where you can search "plant communities by zip code," enter your zip code, and at the bottom of the page, click on a list of plants native to your zip code). Two excellent books are "California Native Plants for the Garden", by Bornstein et al. and "The Care and Maintenance of Southern California Native Plant Gardens" by O'Brien et al.

As to purchasing, most of our local (San Fernando Valley) nurseries carry few, if any. But the more people who request natives at their local nursery, the more likely the nursery is to start carrying them. Theodore Payne in Sunland is a retail native plant nursery and Matilija, though located in Moorpark and a bit of a drive, is a wholesale native plant nursery open to the public at certain times. Go to their website (www.matilijanursery.com) to find out how to get there and the hours it's open for the walk in trade.


