SPEAKER: Karen Mabb, member of California **Parrot Project**



The "urban jungle" Southern California is home to more than a dozen species of parrots parakeets.

Come learn where you can find parrot hotspots and how to identify parrots that you might see on your

urban safaris in Southern California. Karen Mabb will discuss the origins of the California flocks, the ecological factors that help them succeed here and the identification of our locally breeding species. Many of these parrots are native to Mexico and South America. Some are even endangered in areas of their natural distribution. Karen Mabb has been a member of the California Parrot Project since 1995. She is now a biologist residing in San Diego. She has also developed the interests of multiple species habitat conservation and restoration.

Mark Mendelsohn is a wildlife and vegetation biologist working under a cooperative agreement between the Mountains Restoration Trust and National Park Service in the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area. His love for field biology sprouted during his undergraduate work at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, and he completed his master's degree at San Diego State University. There, he studied the effects of habitat fragmentation on the Greater Roadrunner in San Diego County. Mark remains very interested in this topic, in particular its application at Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area (SAMO). In his presentation, Mark will summarize his thesis work, and use it and the literature as a lens for studying the distribution-highlighting citizen science data-of this iconic bird in the greater Santa Monica Mountains region.



AngelFest: Existential Threat to Sepulveda Basin Wildlife Reserve

On January 26, 2016 Muriel Kotin of our Conservation Committee received a "heads up" email from the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACoE) that: "LA City Rec and Parks has requested a waiver from the Corps in order to hold a three-day music festival in Sepulveda Basin on October 7, 8, 9, 2016. They expect 65,000 people each day. The set up would take approximately two weeks prior in order to set up stages, sound systems, lighting etc. with eight days post festival removal of equipment, clean-up and restoration."

The USACoE email broadly identified the areas of the Basin where the festival events would take place, which includes acreage abutting or even including parts of our precious Wildlife Reserve. The email also gave an estimated time-frame (mid- to late February) as to when the details would be forthcoming and the public comment period would begin.

On the evening of March 3, in a focused, analytical meeting, with many voices heard, and using information provided by the festival proponents and USACoE as well as our detailed knowledge of the wildlife known to frequent the area, the Board of Directors of the SFVAS passed the following motion, for public dissemination:

"The San Fernando Valley Audubon Society (SFVAS) is opposed to holding the special event known as AngelFest in the entire eastern area of the Sepulveda Basin known as Woodley Park on October 7–9, 2016 and urges the Army Corps to not waive the conditions of the Special

Events Policy and thereby not grant permission to hold the AngelFest event. The predictable negative impacts on the wildlife within Sepulveda Basin Wildlife Reserve and the adjoining park areas that support foraging wildlife, as well as the loss of public access to the area for up to 26 days are intolerable."

The very next day, March 4, we received the following official email notice from the USACoE:

"Due to the many comments the Corps reviewers provided to the AngelFest proponent's contractor preparing the Environmental Assessment and issues to be addressed, the anticipated public review period is behind original schedule. At this time, I think it will be mid to late April before it is available for review."

The SFVAS Conservation Committee is laser-focused on preventing this potentially devastating event from occurring anywhere near the Wildlife Area. Among our concerns, beyond the obvious impact of 200,000 attendees on the wildlife of the area, are: the use of high-volume acoustic systems as preferred by rock bands, the inclusion of pyrotechnics at the event, broad and intense lighting, limiting of public access to various areas prior to, during and after the event, and many others.

DRONES AND "FIGHTING KITES" IN THE SEPULVEDA BASIN by Patricia Bates

There are two very serious and pervasive problems occurring in the Sepulveda Basin Woodley Park and Wildlife Areas with illegal 'drone' (Unmanned Aircraft System) activity, and kite 'fighting', using abrasive kite line (cord). The kite line is extremely dangerous to persons, wildlife and property, not only when the fighting kites are aloft, but when enthusiasts leave behind lost strings they can't or won't retrieve. We have already collected huge amounts of kite line from trees in the area.



The LAMC needs to be amended to prohibit the flying of fighting kites equipped with abrasive string in these areas, followed by permanent signage and routine enforcement. The San Fernando Valley Audubon Society (SFVAS) in concert with the Sepulveda Basin Wildlife Area Steering Committee is leading the fight to produce solutions to these very serious problems, passing a specific resolution addressing each issue (illegal 'drone' flying and kite fighting), and interfacing with Los Angeles Police, Recreation and Parks, and the Los Angeles City Council to request legislation, permanent signage, and enforcement. The Encino Neighborhood Council has passed similar resolutions.

It is already illegal to operate "drones" (unmanned aircraft systems) in any Los Angeles City Park (Los Angeles Municipal Code (LAMC) §63.44.B.8). Furthermore, the recently enacted LAMC §56.31 prohibits use of drones within five miles of any

airport (this covers the entire Sepulveda Basin) except in designated areas (note that the Apollo model airplane park is a designated area for flying model airplanes and is tightly regulated and supervised). In the past year, the presence of drones in Woodley Park near the wildlife reserve has become routine, often with several of them airborne at the same time. There is a clear danger to users of the facility—many children, as well as wildlife, as a result of this illegal drone activity. The Sepulveda Basin is within five miles of the Van Nuys Airport flight path, which presents a further danger. In addition, there are escalating tensions between individuals attempting to enjoy the recreation facilities and the drone operators.

We commend the Los Angeles Department of Recreation and Parks for installing temporary 'NO DRONE ZONE' signs in Woodley Park. Unfortunately, the signs were quickly removed and stolen by the drone operators. We understand permanent signage will arrive shortly. Furthermore, the Los Angeles Police Department and the Park Rangers have stepped up enforcement. The Los Angeles City Council approved a resolution supporting Senator Boxer's bill requiring no-fly zones for drones, and as information result of provided Councilmember Koretz added the following

language to that resolution, which President Wesson accepted and the City Council approved unanimously: "and that no-fly zones for drones include areas designated as wildlife and nature

reserves,



preserves, refuges, national parks and the like."

January and February Monthly Field Trip Reports (by Richard Barth)

We birded Upper Newport Bay and San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary on January 16. Cool, mostly sunny weather prevailed and we saw a nice assortment of species. A trip highlight was the sighting of a hybrid Eurasian X American Wigeon; two such hybrids had been reported at Upper Newport Bay this fall and winter. Loons are not regularly seen up in the bay but we tallied both Redthroated and Pacific Loons this year. Dunlin and Long-billed Curlew topped our contingent of twelve shorebird species. Our waterfowl list totaled fourteen species, with Hooded Merganser of special interest at UNB along with the hybrid wigeon. Ridgway's Rails serenaded us at two spots along the bay. Our raptors on the trip were Northern Harrier, Osprey, Cooper's Hawk and Turkey Vulture. Other birds of some note were White-faced Ibis, Clark's Grebe, Brown Pelican, Belted Kingfisher, Tree Swallow, Savannah Sparrow, Common Yellowthroat, Cassin's Kingbird and Say's Phoebe.

A beautiful morning greeted us at the Ventura County Game Preserve on February 20. Highlight species seen included Vermilion Flycatcher, White-tailed Kite, Loggerhead Shrike and Dunlin. A Barn Owl flushed from trees just off the trail, a Sora was heard, Marsh Wrens were heard and one was seen, we had long-range looks at a Long-billed Curlew and two White-faced Ibises, Savannah Sparrows were everywhere (we saw at least one "Belding's") and a couple of Wilson's Snipes rose up to perform their zig-zag flight across the wetlands. Western Meadowlark flocks were readily found---one bird perched near us and broke into full song. Other species of interest: American Pipit, Northern Harrier, White-throated Swift, Tree Swallow, Northern Pintail, Greenwinged Teal, Cinnamon Teal, Bufflehead, Greater Yellowlegs, Marbled Godwit, American Avocet, Say's Phoebe and Common Yellowthroat. We missed Yellow-headed and Tricolored Blackbirds this year.

Recap of February 9, 2016 Meeting

Visitors were welcomed and we had introductions all around. There were nineteen in attendance. Ten of which were first time visitors interested in Audubon as well and the preservation of the 20.6 acres adjacent to the Prime Desert Woodland Preserve (PDWP) as well as two people from our local radio station 1470.



Don presented an overview of Audubon History for the newcomers. Then he presented an overview regarding our current efforts to develop a Chapter in Antelope Valley, the Tri-Color Blackbird Habitat at Holiday Lake, and the effort to save the 20.6 acres adjacent to the PDWP. Don emphasized membership in Audubon to help preserve our habitats for our birds and other wildlife.

Don then introduced Dr. Pat Saatzer, Friends of PDWP, to provide background information on the ten-year fight to retrieve the acreage adjacent to the PDWP.

Some of the birds that visit the preserve are Yellow Warbler, Loggerhead Shrike, Merlin, Burrowing Owl, quail, Red-tailed Hawks, and Coopers Hawk, just to name a few, as well as many other desert animals.

Don and Pat were also interviewed live on our local radio station regarding the Desert property. Due to this exposure an interested individual has volunteered to create a social media page to communicate our efforts. A local Boy Scout troop leader has also come forward to ask for help to develop a program for Scout troops in the Antelope Valley Audubon.

Audubon-at-Home by Alan Pollack PLANTING, CARE AND MAINTENANCE OF YOUR NATIVE, WILDLIFE GARDEN

Although one can plant at any time, the best time to plant natives (and non-natives, for that matter) is in the late fall, just before the rainy season. The cooler weather and winter rains minimizes the amount of watering necessary to help plants get established before the dry, hot summer.

Planting is pretty simple: dig a hole twice the width and twice the depth of the pot the plant is in. If the soil is dry, fill it with water one or more times before planting. Refill the hole with the same soil that was dug out so that the surface of the root ball is slightly higher than the surrounding soil. Remove the plant from the pot with as little disturbance to the root ball as possible. Obviously, if it is root bound, one needs to scratch the surface of the root ball to free up the roots a little. With the plant placed slightly higher than surrounding soil, continue to refill with the original soil. With rare exception, DO NOT ADD ANY AMENDMENTS OR FERTILIZER. Use a chopstick or other poker to make sure air pockets are filled with soil. With left over soil, create a basin wall at the drip line of the plant. Add a layer of mulch around the plant, but not touching the trunk/stem crown. Give it some more water to settle the soil and you're done.

Until they are established (usually 2–3 years), all natives require watering. If you've planted at the beginning of the rainy season, Mother Nature will take care of much of that. If there isn't much rain or you've planted in the dry season, then more

attention must be given to water needs. A newly installed plant needs its root ball kept moist until its roots have extended into the surrounding soil (about two weeks). After that, many plants need watering only when the soil in the root zone is getting dry. Watering should be deep, whether that be with drip, overhead, microemitter systems, or hand watering. (Natives actually prefer overhead, but if that's your choice, do it sensibly, and that means do not overwater and do it before the sun comes up.) Once established, not all natives are low water users and drought tolerant. Some will need little to no water; others will need occasional deep watering; and some like regular moisture (e.g., riparian species).

A good sign that a plant is well established is when it doubles in size. Usually, you don't see much growth during the first year or two—that's when the plant is spending most of its energy putting its roots deep in the ground. Once that is accomplished, more outward growth occurs.

Native species generally require little, if any pruning. Some species need to be cut back annually and any pruning beyond that is likely to be for aesthetic reasons or to remove diseased growth. The best time to prune is during the plant's dormancy or right after flowering. Which brings up the fact that seasonal changes for many natives are the opposite of most nonnatives. Winter rains stimulate growth which slows in the spring as flowers emerge. In the summer, dormancy begins as berries and fruits form. In the fall, berries and fruits have ripened, seeds are falling and most plants are fully dormant.

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Conservation of the Phainopepla (Newsletter, that is) by Lynn Maddox

Our newsletter has a venerable history, dating from October, 1928. We love it! But it's expensive. Newsletter costs are among our highest budget items, ranging between \$12,000 and \$13,000 per year recently.

We are trying very hard to reduce this expense. Some local members choose to pay a higher membership fee to receive the printed paper by 1st-class US mail. Some local and national members (more than 200!) have opted to read the newsletter online only and receive email notifications when a new issue is published. These online subscribers often have access to the news about ten days before the printed copies arrive and also can see beautiful "Bird of the Month" photos in color. And nearly 2,000 (yes, 2,000!) newsletters are mailed out to national members for each publication. We receive limited reimbursement from National Audubon for these members, so our own dollars must help cover the newsletter costs for them.

How can you help us reduce costs? So glad you asked!

- You can let us know if you are receiving duplicate mailings or are not interested in local news by contacting Lynn by email or phone as noted above.
- You can keep up with chapter news by checking the website, www.sfvaudubon.org, and by signing up to be notified by e-mail when new items are added. Here's how to do it. On the opening page of the website, enter your e-mail under the grey bar, "Get All our News in your e-mail," at the right-hand side.
- You can keep up with chapter news and issues on Facebook and Instagram.
