

In November 2016, five groups of birders traveled to Honduras to take part in their first Birding for Conservation Tour. Our group included ten participants. He was also responsible for bringing breeding Osprey back to England after an absence of 150 years. Our local leader



was William Orellana, a founder and guide for Beaks and Peaks Birding and Adventure Tours, based in Honduras.

Our photo of the month shows the striking Merlin, a bird of prey formerly known colloquially as a "pigeon hawk." Not a common sight in the Southland, this particular individual delighted local birders by hanging around long enough for it to be observed and photographed by many. The photographer, Alex Viduetsky, is a member of the San Fernando Valley Audubon Society, and has been photographing birds since 2007. He adds, "Birds of prey are

among my favorite avian species and I especially like all falcons, including the Merlin."

Haskell Creek, where it runs through lovely Sepulveda Basin Wildlife Reserve, hosts many riparian trees and shrubs, such as cottonwoods and willows. Songbirds forage and nest in the trees, while egrets and herons fish in this heart of the Wildlife Area. Sadly, it is infested with trash, especially plastic bags, foam cups, and food containers. Please help clean up the mess, restoring our creek!

Equipment and Clothing: You will get muddy and maybe wet. Please wear rugged clothing and shoes or rubber boots. If you have them, bring work gloves and long-handled tools to reach trash.

Directions: The Wildlife Reserve is on the east side of Woodley Ave. about a half mile north of Burbank Blvd. Turn east at the sign for the Japanese Garden (6100 Woodley Ave., Van Nuys, CA. 91406), stay to the right, and follow Wildlife Way beyond the archery range for about a half mile to the last parking area.

January and February Field Trip Reports by Richard Barth

On January 20 we visited Upper Newport Bay and nearby San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. Cool, sunny conditions were ideal for birding. We found 14 species of ducks....the strong presence of Redheads and Northern Pintails was noteworthy this year, and a pair of Hooded Mergansers created considerable interest. Our shorebird contingent of only nine species did not meet expectations but included Long-billed Curlew, always a favorite. Raptors seen were Osprey, Peregrine Falcon, American Kestrel, Cooper's Hawk, Red-tailed Hawk and Turkey Vulture (we missed Northern Harrier this time). Common Gallinule, White-faced Ibis, Forster's Tern, American Pipit, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Marsh Wren and Belted Kingfisher are always good finds. We had comparative looks at Clark's and Western Grebes, at one point side by side. American White Pelican, White-throated Swift, Say's Phoebe, Cassin's Kingbird (heard), Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Common Yellowthroat, Downy Woodpecker, Spotted Towhee (heard) and Common Yellowthroat should be mentioned.

We were scheduled to bird the Ventura County Game Preserve on February 18, but very heavy rain the day before and more rain overnight resulted in the preserve being closed down. The uncertainty surrounding the storm had understandably discouraged any participants from making the trip, so I was alone and decided to check out the Ventura Harbor and Water Treatment Ponds up the coast. Some of my sightings of interest: A pair of Wandering Tattlers and several Surfbirds at the harbor. A Greater Scaup, a Common Merganser with a few Red-breasted Mergansers, a Northern Harrier, an American Pipit, and at least 40 Pied-billed Grebes (35 together) at the treatment ponds.

Consistent with our Mission, SFVAS has historically spent in the range of 97% of our resources (time, effort, and funds) on San Fernando Valley and neighboring areas of LA County programs and conservation efforts. Our Conservation Team has, time and again, taken and Federal advantage hard-won State environmental laws and regulations and the support of national agencies (with their budget allocations) to achieve our results at the local level. For example, we frequently cite the Endangered Species Act, Clean Water Act, National Environmental Policy Act, and regulations of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, U.S.

Army Corps of Engineers, and other Federal agencies to support our local causes.

As soon as the current administration was officially situated, those laws, regulations, and resources came under immediate, direct, and relentless attack through every means possible. It appears that our nation's respect for the environmental health of our planet and all its living inhabitants – flora and fauna – has been tossed aside in preference of immediate, short term, tactical, and (may I say it) self-serving objectives. Environmental science and facts are being thrown out the window in favor of what, profits and million-dollar annual corporate executive bonuses?

It is now clear that SFVAS must increase, reallocate, prioritize, and intensify our Conservation resources, and focus our attention on those issues that are truly existential to our mission and, indeed threaten the wellbeing of our entire world and the political stability of its nations.

As SFVAS Conservation Chair I am asking each of our members (all 1,800+ of you) to actively participate in a dedicated and focused manner to address the threats to our nation, and truly our entire planet, brought by the current, relentless attack on our environment and all its life forms. We will provide the insight and leadership, and I personally promise to encourage all points of view regardless of demographic or political perspective.



Nature Walk Reminders


