## 2017 CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

## Saturday, December 16, 2017 Birders Needed!

Once again this year, the San Fernando Valley Audubon Society will join chapters across the country and in North and South America, Hawaii, and the Caribbean to take part in the National Audubon Society's 118<sup>th</sup> Annual Christmas Bird Count (CBC).

The initial San Fernando Valley CBC was held in 1957 making this our 60th consecutive CBC. Over the years there have been some interesting changes in bird populations in the count circle as the valley has transitioned into a more developed area.

Last year we counted 121 species and 13,141 individuals, somewhat less than our average since 2000, 128 species and 15,935 individuals, continuing a downward trend.

Thoughts are that the longterm drought or perhaps more urbanization is the cause; however it is just as likely we do not have enough counters in the field on count day. Often we have 60 counters, but last year, only 51.

To get a more comprehensive indication of the health of the bird population in the valley, we need more counters. Extensive birding experience is not a prerequisite, only a willingness to come out and count—wind, rain, or shine. Those unable to join one of the count groups may assist by noting species and numbers of birds at backyard feeders, local parks, and neighborhoods, provided such counts take place within a 7.5 mile radius circle from the count center at the intersection of Balboa and Nordhoff. Please report all such counts along with the time spent observing to Jim Moore by e-mail, jimmoore@socal.rr.com no later than January 8, 2018.

Count participation is FREE and open to all. Traditional count sectors are listed below.

## Phainopepla Photo of the Month by David Barton

This month's Photo of the Month is proof of the dividends paid by attending to your own backyard! David Barton, a chapter member and Director, writes, "This Black-throated Blue Warbler, a rare fall migrant on the West Coast, dropped into our backyard bird bath at about 4:30 p.m. on Nov. 2, 2017. I did not have my camera with me at the time (which was probably a good thing, because I might have dropped it in shock). The bird continued in our backyard for several days, and I eventually succeeded in capturing this image with my Canon 7D Mark II, equipped with a Canon EF 400mm f/4 DO IS II USM. I shot at 1/800 of a second and an ISO of 4000. The image was captured in RAW and later converted to JPG. It's not every day that we add a new North American wood warbler to our yard list!"

## Audubon-at-Home by Alan Pollack

Concerned about visiting birds, a reader inquires how to rid herself of feral cats coming uninvited in her backyard. This is a difficult problem. First, determine if they are really feral and not a neighbor's pet cat. A flyer in mailboxes and/or a posting on the Nextdoor website can be helpful in this. If it is feral and there are many ferals in the neighborhood, animal control can be contacted for trapping. If there are just one or two, you could try to trap and bring to animal control, but be very cautious with the captured animal. A territorial dog in the backyard works well and motion sensor sprinklers might work. Guaranteed to work would be an invitation to a coyote to hang out in the neighborhood...LOL. Living near Pierce College, coyotes nesting there eliminated the feral cats in my neighborhood.

## September and October Field Trip Reports by Richard Barth

On September 16 we birded Orange County's Huntington Central Park and Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve. HCP yielded Red-shouldered Hawk, Black-headed Grosbeak, Western Tanager, Pacific-slope Flycatcher, Western Wood-Pewee, House Wren, Downy Woodpecker, Wilson's Warbler, Black-throated Gray Warbler, Orange-crowned Warbler, Common Yellowthroat, Western Bluebird and Song Sparrow. An ephemeral lake in the center of the park attracted Belted Kingfisher and Green Heron, while Red-winged Blackbirds unexpectedly roamed the property. We had quick looks at what appeared to be a Tennessee Warbler that had been reported recently in the park. Of interest were the numerous flocks of exotic finches featuring Scaly-breasted Munia, Orange-cheeked Waxbill, Bronze Mannikin and Pintailed Whydah. A female Lazuli Bunting briefly joined one of the flocks. Our Bolsa Chica visit was also very productive, with Reddish Egret being the star species on hand. We had thirteen species of shorebirds including Ruddy Turnstone, Snowy Plover, Whimbrel and Long-billed Curlew. Well seen were Caspian, Royal, Elegant and Forster's Tern (Common Tern was missed but some of the tern flocks were too far away to be effectively studied). State endangered "Belding's" Savannah Sparrow was tallied, but we couldn't find Ridgway's Rail.

October 21 marked our trip to El Dorado Park in Long Beach. No SFVAS members attended but ten birders from Long Beach joined me. We found an immature female Vermilion Flycatcher in Area III and a male Hairy Woodpecker in the Nature Center---probably the highlight sightings of the day. A Northern Flicker in Area II showed yellowish wing and tail feathers in flight but could not be confirmed as a pure "Yellow-shafted" with no clear look at the head markings. Our warblers were Black-throated Gray, Wilson's, Orange-crowned and Townsend's. Sparrows on hand were Chipping, Lincoln's, Song, White-crowned and "Oregon" Junco. We heard Red-shouldered Hawk, Hutton's Vireo and Hermit Thrush. Blue-gray Gnatcatcher is always a treat in this park. Other species of interest for the day were Ring-necked Duck, Ruddy Duck, Green Heron, House Wren, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Nuttall's and Downy Woodpeckers, "Red-shafted" Flicker, Western Bluebird, Say's Phoebe and Cassin's Kingbird. We missed a Tropical Kingbird that had been reported recently.

## Conservation Corner by Dave Weeshoff

## **Hints for Helping Hands**

In this era of multiple existential threats to avian populations, their habitats, food sources and safety, sometimes it feels really good to do some little things that collectively will make a big difference. I found a very interesting article in an old WildBirds Magazine, January/February 2011, which lists 25 things each of us can do to improve the plight of birds, worldwide and locally.

If you have other ideas (e.g., tree trimming) I'll pass them on in a future commentary.

I have made brief annotations, after the colons, where it might be helpful.

- 1. Drink bird-friendly coffee: shade-coffee plantations
- 2. Buy better bananas for the birds: certified and shade-grown
- 3. Use sustainable lumber: certified as sustainable
- 4. Talk about bird-friendly cell-phone towers: work with local city planners - call Dave
- Shed light on nocturnal collisions: SFVAS is looking for volunteers to help
- 6. Consider climate change: see <u>www.Audubon.org</u> for much information
- Choose safer seafood: see <u>www.abcbirds.org</u> about seafood bycatch
- Discuss alternative energy: SFVAS is looking for volunteers to help
- 9. Talk about birds at plant nurseries: SFVAS Alan Pollack can help see his listing
- 10. Buy a hunting license: their sales support wildlife management
- 11. Encouraging keeping cats indoors: my cats will live longer, healthier and happier indoors
- 12. Get the lead out: learn about the issue: chat with your hunter friends about lead-free ammo
- Follow pesticide instructions: http://audubonmagazine.org/ backyard/backyard0005.html

- 14. Purchase a US FWS Duck Stamp: 98% of the \$15 goes to wetlands and grassland conservation
- 15. Chat with the pest-control staff: about pesticides, if you have a service
- 16. Thank corporations that promote bird conservation: let Dave know he'll write nice letters
- 17. Create safer windows: apply film over windows, decals, etc.
- 18. Clean your feeders often: and pick up seed waste, to protect bird health
- 19. Learn more about birds: call Dave for many books and publications; also bird walks, field trips
- 20. Prepare the proper menu at feeders: chat with your local, knowledgeable bird food provider
- 21. Ensure safe feeding stations: near brush or trees; very close or very far from windows
- 22. Participate in citizen science: Christmas Bird Count; Climate Watch; and others call Dave
- 23. Volunteer: what can I say? SFVAS and many other nonprofits need all kinds of help
- 24. Donate used optics, field guides and other materials: SFVAS well help you call Dave
- 25. Share your passion for birds: never miss a chance to spread your enthusiasm! It's infectious.
