#### Report on May and June Monthly Field Trips by Richard Barth

Our field trip destination on May 12 was the L.A. River at Willow Street in Long Beach, followed by a visit to DeForest Park in N. Long Beach. The only participant joining me was Jeff Boyd, an excellent birder from Long Beach. Our birding at Willow Street produced the expected fare like Black-necked Stilt, American Avocet, Killdeer, Spotted Sandpiper, four of the herons (including Green Heron) and three gull species. Other species of interest here: Long-billed Dowitcher, Gadwall (one pair), Ruddy Duck, Caspian Tern, Pied-billed Grebe and Western Grebe. DeForest Park featured migrant species Western Wood-Pewee, Pacific-slope Flycatcher, Warbling Vireo, Swainson's Thrush, Western Tanager, Black-headed Grosbeak (heard) and Hermit, Yellow, Wilson's and Townsend's Warblers. Also on hand: Say's Phoebe and Song Sparrow. Vaux's Swift and Cliff, Barn and Rough-winged Swallows foraged overhead. Our raptors for the day were Peregrine, American Kestrel and Cooper's Hawk.

We birded Rancho Sierra Vista Preserve in Ventura County on June 9. Warm, breezy weather prevailed. Some of our highlight observations: a White-tailed Kite "kiting" over the grasslands, a male Costa's Hummingbird posing on a leafless bush along the trail, several cooperative Ash-throated Flycatchers we were able to study, Blue Grosbeaks popping up here and there, one male Lazuli Bunting making a brief appearance (surprisingly difficult to find here) and Wrentits seen and heard in numerous spots. Our woodpeckers were Nuttall's and Acorn. Our swallows were Cliff, Barn, Rough-winged and Violet-green. We saw Nanday Parakeets and a fly-over flock of Amazon type parrots. Other birds on hand: California Quail, Oak Titmouse, American Kestrel, Hooded Oriole (heard), Cassin's Kingbird, Say's Phoebe, Western Bluebird, Bewick's Wren, Spotted Towhee (heard) and Common Yellowthroat. Again this year we missed target birds Grasshopper Sparrow and Greater Roadrunner.

#### 2018 Audubon California Advocacy Day

2018 - The Year of The Bird and the 100th anniversary of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act were at the forefront of the message Audubon activists from all over California shared with elected representatives at the State Capitol on June 20. It was my third year to participate in Advocacy Day, and as always, was productive and enjoyable.

Chapter members, including myself and Audubon California staff—nearly 70 in all—took part in 57 meetings with legislators and/or their legislative staff. During breaks between meetings, some of the 14 groups dropped in on hearings, checked out the Senate and Assembly chambers, went birding in the park and caught up with Auduboners from across the state.

As passionate advocates, we pushed for protections for migratory birds, protecting our coasts and public lands from oil spills, expanding opportunities for environmental education, and protecting important habitat for birds and people during meetings with legislators, including those from the San Fernando Valley and the greater Southern California area. We also thanked all who assisted in supporting the passage of Proposition 68 on the June ballot.

Through all these efforts we established our credibility and willingness to work with legislators on both sides of the aisle in furtherance of wildlife conservation, habitat protections, and especially protecting and expanding bird protections.

It was also a great chance to connect with colleagues and chapter members from all over the state. Many fellow Audubon chapter members found spending the day getting to know each other and members of Audubon California staff inspirational.

# 8 Ways to Reduce your Plastic Waste

If there's one material we can't seem to live without, it's plastic. And there's a reason for that: It's cheap, durable, and lightweight, making it perfect for everything from iPhones to eyewear.

But what makes plastic so useful for humans is exactly what makes it a nasty environmental contaminate – it spreads easily and takes forever to degrade, finding its way to our lands and oceans where it wreaks havoc on wildlife. To date, at least <u>700</u> species of marine animals – pelicans, albatrosses, fulmars, petrels, shearwaters and shorebirds, as well as turtles dolphins and whales, have been entangled by plastic or mistaken it for food. The result is often entanglement, <u>suffocation or starvation</u>.

Since the 1950s, when single-use plastic products became cheap, we've generated 8.3 billion metric tons of the stuff, of which a scant nine percent has been recycled. And by 2050, scientists predict the oceans will stock more plastic than fish.

But as problematic and worrisome as all of this is, completely cutting plastic from our lives is impossible at this point. Reducing your plastic use, however, is surprisingly easy and pain-free. You're not going to end the problem overnight, but here are some simple tricks to waste less.

# 1. Cut Out Plastic Cutlery—Especially When Ordering In

If you're ordering takeout in person or over the phone, ask the restaurant to skip the plastic flatware.

## 2. Party Plastic-Free

One great way to reduce plastic waste is to simply use real glasses, cups and other tableware.

#### 3. Say Bye Bye to Balloons

Many balloons are made of plastic, and when they get away, they can travel for thousands of miles before touching down. Some birds mistake them for food, and others mistake them (or their ribbons) for nesting material.

Birds aren't the only animals that balloons harm either; they pose dangers to all other manners of wildlife, including turtles and whales.

# 4. Take Advantage of Tap Water

Evian. Fuji. Smart Water. They all sound special—but are they really any healthier or tastier than tap water? In most parts of the world with public, potable water, tap is just as safe to drink as the stuff that comes in plastics. So how can you take advantage of this incredible public resource? Find a reusable bottle that you love, and don't let it leave your side.

# 5. Skip the Plastic Straws

Ah, the humble straw: American staple, transporter of sodas and iced coffee, an entertaining bubble machine—and also threat to wildlife, as anyone who's seen an <u>impaled sea turtle</u> can attest.

If you don't need these suckers, don't use them. Tell your server to skip the straws as soon as you sit down at a restaurant, or use a refillable cup at your local coffee shop.

# 6. Buy Bulk Foods

Food and packaging containers account for <u>nearly half</u> of all trash in landfills, according to the EPA, and buying bulk can help stem that stream.

#### 7. Get Better at Recycling

While everyone knows they should be recycling by now, even the best of us still don't always get it right.

Turns out, we recycle only a fraction of the plastic waste we produce, even bottles with redemption value, and that's partly due to poor recycling techniques. You do, in fact, need to rinse out your containers, for example. Otherwise they might contaminate plastics around them and end up in a landfill. Also, avoid tossing out recycling in a used plastic bag. What might seem like a smart twofer turns out to be potentially damaging to recycling machinery.

## 8. Actually Remember Your Reusable Bag

You probably already have plenty of reusable bags, but the tricky part is remembering to take them anywhere. If you're worried you'll forget them, just add "reusable bag" to your shopping list.
