For Nature Education and the Conservation of Wildlife



John McCormack will be presenting at the September 26 SFV Audubon meeting. He is an Associate Professor at Occidental College and also the Director and Curator of the Moore Laboratory of Zoology. The Moore Lab was founded in 1951 by Robert T. Moore and houses the world's largest Mexican bird collection at 65,000 specimens. The Moore Lab is investigating change in Mexico's birdlife between then and now using the specimens in the collection. Prof. McCormack will tie in this research with some colorful local history on the development of ornithology in Los Angeles.

John is an elected member of the American Ornithologist's Union and chair of the Communications Committee for the AOU and Cooper Ornithological Society.

He is also an Associate Editor at the journal Systematic Biology. He has been funded by the National Science Foundation, Keck Foundation, and The Fletcher Jones Foundation. He is published in journals including *Science*, *Nature*, and *Systematic Biology*.



Birdathon 2019

This year we had an amazing turnout of participants in our annual Birdathon. Our dedicated walk leaders shared their time and expertise on their walks during our two month event. Some highlights included:

"We missed the Yellow-breasted Chat at Malibu Creek SP and we know was there, but we found two Lawrence's Goldfinches instead! At Crystal Cove SP in OC we found a really weird looking California Thrasher, which was either leucistic or injured. And we found the Reddish Egret at Bolsa Chica, a species that is known to be likely there but we've only seen a few times." – Muriel Kotin

"We saw many of the usual locals, at O'Melveny Park, along with a couple of unusual sightings including a Western Wood-Pewee and Black-Chinned Hummingbird. Also, we had a good look at a Blue-Gray Gnatcatcher, which was exceptional for me" —Barbara Heidemann

"The event took place as part of our regular third Sunday-of-the-month bird walk at Malibu Creek State Park. We covered the Grassland Trail, as well as Crag's Road to the visitor's center and returned back by way of the creek. High thin morning clouds gave way to sunny skies about 10:00 a.m. Worthy of note: good scope looks at a mated pair of Cooper's Hawks sharing prey at their nest, a strong showing of spring migrants such as Lazuli Buntings, Blue Grosbeaks and Black-headed Grosbeaks singing their hearts out, and a special showing by a Yellow-breasted Chat." – Dave Barton

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Change to Beginning Birds-and-Nature Walks at the Sepulveda Basin Wildlife Reserve: *Now Available for Groups by Reservation Only*

To better match community interest, San Fernando Valley Audubon's Birds-and-Nature Walks for families and beginners are changing format. They had been offered on second Saturday mornings October through March, as well as by reservation for groups. They are NOW available ONLY BY RESERVATION for groups. Reservations will be available for flexible days and times, including school mornings, weekend mornings, and after school. For the most part we will avoid scheduling walks in the summer months. Groups should be a minimum of 10–12 people.

Participants will stroll through the lovely Sepulveda Basin Wildlife Reserve with a guide, enjoying its trails and wildlife lake. Many kinds of birds are found there, along with lizards, cottontail rabbits, butterflies, fish and more. Participants will learn about the plants and birds and see them up close and discover why this is such a special place. We have binoculars to loan or you can use your own.

These walks are for groups such as school classes not eligible for our SBEEP program, scouting and other youth groups, community centers, religious centers, environmental groups, and clubs.

May and June Field Trip Reports by Richard Barth

On May 11 we traveled to Long Beach---to the L.A. River at Willow St, then on to DeForest Park. At Willow we saw most of the species expected there this time of year...Black-necked Stilt, American Avocet, Killdeer, Caspian Tern, Western Gull, California Gull, Black-crowned Night-Heron and Spotted Sandpiper. Also tallied were American White Pelican, Peregrine Falcon, Green Heron, Snowy Egret, Great Egret, Long-billed Dowitcher, Ruddy Duck, Cliff Swallow, Red-winged Blackbird, Common Yellowthroat and (outside the river) Cooper's Hawk and Hooded Oriole. We were hoping to see some special northbound shorebirds like Wilson's Phalarope, but struck out. DeForest Park produced a generous supply of warblers (Yellow, Hermit, Wilson's and Townsend's) plus Warbling Vireo, Black-headed Grosbeak, Western Tanager, Swainson's Thrush, Slate-colored Dark-eyed Junco, Western Wood-Pewee, Western Bluebird, Olive-sided Flycatcher, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Hooded Oriole, Pin-tailed Whydah and a ("bird of the day") Summer Tanager.

We visited Rancho Sierra Vista Preserve near Thousand Oaks on June 8. Clear, mild weather prevailed. Blue Grosbeak, Lazuli Bunting, Willow Flycatcher and Ash-throated Flycatcher were among our notable sightings. We also picked up Cassin's Kingbird, California Quail, Black-chinned Hummingbird, House Wren, Spotted Towhee, Song Sparrow, Cliff Swallow (abundant), Common Yellowthroat, Oak Titmouse, Western Bluebird and a family of Red-tailed Hawks. Orioles were heard but not located. Our most rewarding tally of the day was scored at nearby Rancho Potrero Open Space, where a (target species) Grasshopper Sparrow was seen by four of us after the preserve walk.

Conservation Corner-Dave Weeshoff,

Just before last November's election I wrote the "Letter to the Editor" below:

"Measure W - The Safe Clean Water Program

Los Angeles County has had a water problem for over a century. Each year there may be too much or not enough rainwater, and an uneven distribution throughout our neighborhoods due to mountains, valleys, etc. We need a consistent, affordable supply of clean and safe water to allow our communities to thrive.

Historically we have depended on water—more than 70%—from outside our region to fill our growing needs. With the increasing state-wide demands of agriculture, thirsty populations in other regions, and the serious threat of climate change droughts, our regional water future is uncertain, at best. We must make better use of the rain and ground water we have. An important solution is Measure W on our November ballot.

Measure W will provide for specific, well-planned projects, appropriate to the various neighborhoods, for increasing stormwater and urban runoff capture and reduce pollution of our local watersheds. This will provide increased water supply and quality, as well as other community investment benefits.

I have been following Los Angeles County watershed issues for a dozen years, participating in public and private meeting and seminars, which included many organizations trying to work out various specific solutions. Measure W will incorporate those ideas and proposals into a prioritized, funded, ongoing set of solutions to address the threats to our water supply and reduce our reliance on external sources of water, the essence of our region's economy. I acknowledge that no one wants additional taxes, but as a 65 year citizen of Los Angeles County concerned with solutions to our water crisis, I know that we must invest in our future now, and locally, to prevent even more serious problems in the future. The solutions are unlikely to come from either Washington or Sacramento. Vote YES on Measure W."

Measure W passed with a 69% YES vote! Thank You!

Last month I attended a meeting of "OurWaterLA", a coalition of non-profit organizations engaged to advise the L.A. County Safe Clean Water Program, administered by the L.A. County Flood Control District (LACFCD), to achieve the mission of Measure W. I advocated to place emphasis on environmental stewardship,

wildlife protections, drought-tolerant native plants, biodiversity, and recreation opportunities.

Come November, when your L.A. County Property Tax bills arrive and you see a parcel tax for the Safe Clean Water Program, please note there are many concerned and committed activists working on your behalf to insist that your tax dollars are well spent though a community-based, transparent process.

Frank Hoffman, Master Falconer, presented to SFVAS about the ancient art of falconry. Frank, who is a full-time employee of LA County Department of Parks and Recreation, somehow makes time to practice the art and mentor others. As he spoke, it became clear that falconry is nearly a full-time occupation in itself, and his wife is also fully involved. A substantial portion of his presentation

rules and regulations that falconers have to meet to be qualified, and clearly the well-being of the birds is the most important factor. Regulations provide for a very precise type of aviary, how the birds are fed and trained, and restrictions on hunting and the keeping of different birds of prey. Frank also emphasized how the hunting process is still very much a part of nature, and is not without hazards for the birds, as other larger birds may hunt the hunting falcon. Frank brought his beautiful owl to the meeting,

a very impressive bird with remarkable

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Chow Mein Noodle Bird's Nest Cookies

These cookies came across my radar screen at Easter, and I bought the ingredients. Then life got busy and I never got around to it. BUT, SFVAS events are the perfect place to trot them out, and nothing could be easier (no cooking!). And they are kid-friendly, so they can get involved too.

Ingredients: 2 cups semisweet chocolate chips (you can substitute butterscotch if you want), 1 cup peanut butter (any style), 2 cups chow mein noodles, 10 bird egg candies (or peanuts, or jelly beans)



Steps:

- (1) Line a baking sheet with wax paper (I used parchment paper, worked fine).
- (2) Place chocolate chips and peanut butter in a microwave-safe container. Heat on 50% power for 1 minute. Stir and repeat until melted.
- (3) Stir in chow mein noodles until fully coated.
- (4) Drop by tablespoonful onto the baking sheet, poking a hole in the middle for your eggs.
- (5) Place a few of your egg candies (or whatever) in the center of each nest.
- (6) Refrigerate until firm. Store leftovers in an airtight container in the refrigerator, especially in hot weather.

So easy, and they look so realistic! Marianne Davis
