Topic: National Audubon Society's 2019 Climate Report

Our presenter at the January 23, 2020 general meeting will be Dave Weeshoff, SFVAS Conservation Chair. He will present National Audubon Society's 2019 Climate Report, "Survival by Degrees, 389 Bird Species on the Brink." He will review the details of the Report including the consequences of Global Climate Change and other impactful threats on California and local Los Angeles County species as well as an overall North America perspective. He will also review what we can do as individuals, and as a

Chapter, to make a difference.

Dave graduated from Utah State University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Experimental Psychology in 1968. Immediately after graduation he joined the IBM Corporation, and retired from IBM in 2004. Post-retirement he became a volunteer and docent with International Bird Rescue. He was on the Board of Directors for five years and Chairman for three of those years. While working with sick, orphaned, oiled, and injured aquatic birds, it became apparent that the water quality in the local area was affecting the health of the animals. In response to this, Dave joined the Speaker's Bureau of Heal the Bay.

Dave joined San Fernando Valley Audubon Society in 2006, was President and Chair of the Classroom Education Program of the chapter. He is a frequent guest speaker to adult and children's groups on avian and environmental issues. Dave travels frequently in search of interesting aquatic birds and mammals, including trips to the Antarctic, Iceland, Greenland, Arctic Canada, Galapagos, New Zealand, Alaska National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR), Chilean Patagonia, Easter Island. Madagascar, and Midway Atoll, as well as various USA destinations.



2019 CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

Saturday, December 14, 2019 Birders Needed!

Once again the San Fernando Valley Audubon Society will join chapters across the country and in North and South America, Hawaii, and the Caribbean to take part in the National Audubon Society's 120th annual Christmas Bird Count (CBC).

The initial San Fernando Valley CBC was held in 1957 making this our 63rd successive CBC. Over the years there have been some interesting changes in bird populations in the count circle as the valley has transitioned into a more developed area.

Last year we counted 128 species and 12,000 individuals, somewhat lower than our average since 2000, continuing a downward trend.

In order to get the most comprehensive indication of the health of our bird population in the valley, we need as many counters as possible. Extensive birding experience is not a prerequisite, only a willingness to come out and count—wind, rain, or shine. Those unable to join one of the count groups may assist by noting species and numbers of birds at backyard feeders, local parks, and neighborhoods provided such counts take place within a 7.5 mile radius circle from the count center at the intersection of Balboa Blvd. and Nordhoff Street. Please report all such counts, along with the time spent observing, by e-mail to Alexander deBarros, alexanderdebarros@yahoo.com, no later than January 6, 2020.

NOTE: O'Melveny Park and Limekiln, Moonshine, & Aliso Canyons all burned in the Saddleridge Fire, and may be subject to mudslides. If rain is forecasted for December 14, or if mudslides occur in the week preceding the CBC, the counts at these locations will be canceled. Any of this information may change between now and count day. Contact Alexander deBarros, or check stvaudubon.org for latest information.



In addition to the CBC, we will be conducting a pre-count, where we will scout extremely small, underbirded parks for rarities. While the chances of finding anything are slim, if there is an American Redstart, or a Hammond's Flycatcher, or anything else that we don't usually see around here, we certainly don't want to miss it. If you are interested in participating in the pre-count, please e-mail alexanderdebarros@yahoo.com before December 9. The pre-count will take place from December 11 to 13. Like with the CBC, extensive experience is not necessary, only a willingness to go birding.

Conservation Corner—Dave Weeshoff, Conservation Chair

As an ardent bird lover like you, I was excited to learn of Audubon's newest study, **Survival by Degrees: 389 Bird Species on the Brink**, which illustrates in extraordinary detail the future of North American birds under a changing climate. Using the same climate models as 80 countries, plus 140 million bird records—including observational data from bird lovers nationwide—the report reveals the effects a warming climate will have on more than 600 bird species through the end of the century. The report includes a first-of-its-kind zip code based climate tool: **Audubon's Birds and Climate Visualizer**, which shows how climate change will impact local birds and our community—and ways you can help.

Audubon's science shows that the majority of North American bird species—even familiar, beloved birds like the Wood Thrush and American Robin—are at risk of extinction from climate change.

An important takeaway from Audubon's new climate report is that if we take aggressive action now, we can help 76% of vulnerable species have a better chance of survival.

One of the most important things you can do to fight climate change is also one of the simplest: Talk about it. Research shows that discussing global warming with family and friends reinforces that the crisis is real and the science unequivocal. And yet, nearly two-thirds of Americans say they rarely or never have those conversations. For help in clarifying your personal message, the Audubon website has a "Guide to Climate Action" section outlining where to begin and how to amplify your efforts to make lasting change in the world.

As another example of what you can do, right now, Congress is considering a bill - The Better Energy Storage Technology (BEST) Act of 2019 - that would help jumpstart the development of important technology to keep our electric grid resilient and reliable as we phase out fossil fuels and make way for clean, renewable energy sources. You can help by asking your members of Congress to cosponsor the BEST Act to invest in a cleaner tomorrow.

Please, go to www.Audubon.org for the Audubon report and to learn what more you can do. Climate Change is an existential threat to all life on our planet - no exaggeration - and each of us can do our part to minimize the impacts and the consequences.

September and October Field Trip Reports by Richard Barth

We visited Huntington Beach Central Park and Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve on September 21. The park yielded no rarities but kept us busy with exotic finch species....Pin-tailed Whydah (including one breeding male with it's spectacular long tail), Orange-cheeked Waxbill, Swinhoe's White-eye and Scaly-breasted Munia. We also managed to see six of the expected west-coast warblers: Black-throated Gray, Townsend's, Yellow, Wilson's, Orange-crowned and Common Yellowthroat. Other birds of interest: Western Tanager, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, White-crowned Sparrow, Song Sparrow, White-faced Ibis, Green Heron, Western Wood-Pewee, Say's Phoebe, House Wren, Downy Woodpecker, Western Bluebird, Hutton's Vireo (heard) and Red-winged Blackbird. Bolsa Chica produced target species Reddish Egret (two adults flew past us and landed in open view) and California's endangered Belding's Savannah Sparrow (several seen popping in and out of the pickleweed). Honorable mention at the reserve were Ruddy Turnstone, Long-billed Curlew, Willet, Marbled Godwit, Greater Yellowlegs, Black-bellied Plover, Forster's Tern, Eared Grebe and both pelican species.

October 19 marked the field trip to El Dorado Park in Long Beach. Five birders from Long Beach joined me. While no real rarities made our list, we found some birds of interest. Red-breasted Nuthatch, Sharp-shinned Hawk and Hermit Warbler probably created the most discussion while Red-shouldered Hawk, Osprey, Wilson's Warbler, American Pipit, Western Meadowlark, Hutton's Vireo, Chipping Sparrow, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Hermit Thrush, Western Bluebird, and White-throated Swift got in on the action. Downy Woodpecker, Nuttall's Woodpecker and Northern Flicker were accounted for. Species in good supply: Song Sparrow, Townsend's Warbler, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Orange-crowned Warbler, Cassin's Kingbird, Common Yellowthroat and Ruby-crowned Kinglet.

Ranger Torres saw problems and sought equitable solutions. He is the standard bearer. Let him continue to be our inspiration as stewards of nature.
