April Zoom Program: The Great Sandhill Crane Migration-Conservation Success in the Midwest Speaker: Matt Fong



Thursday, April 25, 2024, 7:00—8:30 p.m.

he Crane Trust works to preserve and maintain habitat for both the most numerous and the rarest of 15 crane species worldwide: Sandhill Cranes and Whooping Cranes. In March, Sandhill Cranes roost around the Platte River in Nebraska. As well, some of only 545 Whooping Cranes rely on the river to protect their migration route.

The Crane Trust works to research and preserve the complex ecological balance of the Platte ecosystem. The understanding of the history, diversity, and sustainability of these fragile systems are shared through photography, time-lapse videos, and other means (including presentations like ours) to

inform people all over the United States.

Matt Fong has lived near the Platte River his entire life. His work focuses on connecting with the donors and supporters of the Crane Trust. He received his bachelor's degree from Hastings College and an MBA from the University of Nebraska. He and his wife live in Hastings with their daughter and English Bulldog.

he author will provide a 30-40 minute overview of his new biography of Senator George P. McLean, titled A Connecticut Yankee Goes to Washington: Senator George P. McLean, Birdman of the Senate. This is the story of how Connecticut's George P. McLean helped establish lasting legal protections for birds, overseeing passage of the 1918 Migratory Bird Treaty Act, landmark environmental protection legislation that is still in effect today. Greeley, McLean's great-great nephew, puts McLean's victory for birds in the context of his distinguished forty-five-year career marked by many acts of reform during a time of widespread corruption and political instability. David Allen Sibley, author and illustrator of The Sibley Guide to Birds, writes of the book: "On one level this is a fascinating, and thoroughly researched, glimpse into the workings of US politics in the early twentieth century. On another level it's an inspiring story of one man's determination and steadfast commitment to securing legal protections for birds. I am glad to know more about George McLean." A Connecticut Yankee Goes to Washington was published by the Rochester Institute of Technology Press in March 2023.

Will McLean Greeley grew up in West Michigan with a passion for American history, politics, and birds. He earned a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Michigan and then a master's degree from Michigan in archives administration. After retiring from a thirty-five year career in government and corporate market research, he embarked upon a three-year research and writing journey to learn about his great-great-uncle George P. McLean and his legacy. Married and the father of two sons (and two grandchildren), Greeley lives in Midland, Michigan. A Connecticut Yankee Goes to Washington is his first book.

Traditionally, Birdathon has been the major support for our Sepulveda Basin Environmental Education Program (SBEEP), carried out in partnership with the Resource Conservation District of Santa Monica Mountains (RCDSMM) to provide teacher training and field trips to the Sepulveda Basin Wildlife Reserve for sixty classes, nearly 2000 children from the Los Angeles Unified School District, largely from Title 1 schools that most need our help. In recent years, the pandemic shut down almost all such field trips. However, now that the pandemic has eased, the students have

ost of the names you will find on our ballot (next page) should be familiar to you. These are the people who have volunteered their services to the chapter for many years and have offered to continue their service for the 2024–2025 year.

We are happy to introduce you to two new individuals that will be joining the SFVAS board as 1st year Board Members-at-Large.

Katheryn Barton joined the Board in 2016 as a Board Member-at-Large. She has served as President for the past two years and is on the ballot for another two years as President. She has also been the co-leader with her spouse, David, of the monthly birding trips at Malibu Canyon State Park. With Kathy at the helm for the past two years, our chapter has been in good hands, and she would like to continue leading our chapter for the next two.

Rebecca LeVine is on the ballot to serve as 1st Vice-President for the second term of two years. Your Proxy must be received by the Society prior to the meeting in order to be counted. Once your Proxy is received by the Society it cannot be revoked.

Please indicate whether you approve or disapprove of the election of each candidate. Check "Yes" if you approve, or "No" if you do not approve. Alternatively, you may indicate that you withhold your vote rather than approving or disapproving a candidate. Only votes approving a candidate will be counted in the election.

Withholding your vote means that you abstain from voting – you would still be participating in the election, but no vote would be recorded on your behalf for or against the candidate.

In our monthly bird sit we spend time in beautiful O'Melveny Park observing and journaling whatever catches our fancy. But Patty Ryan tried "sound journaling" for the first time in December and reported "If you enjoy music, radio, audio books and even the sound of silence then you might consider

trying 'sound journaling.' Birding has made me more attuned to sounds in nature, but you really find out just how much when you sit quietly and try to take it all in. I say "try" because I could not record fast enough all the sounds bombarding me in this "quiet" little park. Maybe our minds have learned to block out irrelevant sounds because even on bird walks I don't recall hearing so many sounds. It was an amazing experience!"

Join us on the second Tuesday of the month at the picnic tables near the bathrooms in O'Melveny Park in Granada Hills. No artistic expertise is needed. Bring binoculars or a camera, a notebook or journal, and something to write or draw with. Bring a cushion or portable chair if you'd like. 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Phainopepla

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Hughes is the daughter of Sylvia Plath and Ted Hughes, so she has big writing shoes to fill. She does an entertaining job of it. She clearly found emotional fulfillment with this bird (while her sod of a husband

worked his way out of her life) and documents every step of his development as a hatchling (their nest had been attacked, a sib killed), and finally his reluctant departure. George personifies magpie-brain, as he loves all things bright and shiny, and especially anything colored red. It was also wonderful to read how he worked out what physical reality was, using his beak to explore paint cracks and anything else that caught his magpie fancy.

Hughes was unbelievably patient with this bird, dealing with his pooping all over and creating chaos in her house. Her everyday attire included a heavy work shirt that protected her from bird poop cascading down her back as the bird perched on her shoulder. Raising wild birds requires considerable grit, and she has far more of it than this reader would ever consider. The book hurtles onward towards the inevitable, when George takes off and does not return, and Hughes turns to rescue owls as companions (the husband is gone at this point). At the end she has 13 owls, plus an assortment of other animals. Available from LAPL. —by Marianne Davis
